

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Today we celebrate Palm Sunday - the beginning of our Holy Week. Our liturgy starts with the account of Jesus humbly entering into Jerusalem

riding a donkey. People put cloaks and palm branches in His pathway crying, "Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" It is with great joy that Christ was being honored as king. Still in the same breath, we are filled with sorrow as we reflect

on Christ's passion and death. Thankfully, we know the glorious outcome of this painful journey. Today, as we read about the climax of Christ's mission here on earth, we are reminded that **He is the Perfect** Steward, a model for us all on our stewardship journey.

Our First Reading, from the prophet Isaiah, portrays a suffering servant. The suffering servant, in many ways, foreshadows what Jesus endured during His passion - "I gave my back to those who beat me... my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting." Christ endured such tortures, knowing that He did not deserve them, but still He humbly submitted to them. As we embark on this Holy Week, let us take some time to reflect on the life of Christ as He is our model Steward, and may we strive to imitate Him daily.

Good Friday Thought

ECCE HOMO - Latin for "Behold the Man"

Ecce Homo are the Latin words used by Pontius Pilate in the Gospel of St. John when he presents a scourged Jesus, bound and crowned with thorns, to a hostile crowd shortly before his crucifixion. Jesus' final hour on earth was rapidly approaching and he was fully aware that it was to be a very brutal and torturous conclusion. As a human being, he had to be overcome with fear and terror as the events of the first Good Friday unfolded. Yet, he did not pray to be spared from the hour of doom, but prayed to the Father, "I am troubled now, but it was for this purpose *I came to this hour.*" As Jesus approached the end, he believed that his tragic, but love-filled death and subsequent Resurrection, would eventually make sense to his devoted legion of followers. A holy, innocent, undefiled man, who knew nothing of personal sin, came to blot out the sins of the world by laying his life down for us. On this Good Friday 2024, take time to quietly meditate on what Jesus endured for us and why he endured it. Jesus' time on the Golgotha hill afforded all of us the opportunity to someday join him in the glory of Heaven. That is something to think and pray about.

Flogging vs Scourging

In the Passion narratives, Pilate originally offers to have Jesus flogged (despite his innocence), but then, caving in to the mob mentality of the opponents of Jesus, Pilate proceeds to sentence Jesus to a public scourging and crucifixion. Under Roman law, there was a distinct difference between a flogging and a scourging. *Flogging* was a disciplinary beating as punishment for some type of misdeed by the offender, and was limited to a limited number of blows from the Roman *flagellum*, a whip with pieces of rock and bone attached to the leather cords of the whip, designed to lacerate and tear the flesh. Floggings were not intended to kill the offender. rather punish and release. A *scourging*, on the other hand, was the preliminary act to the actual execution of the victim, and the blows from the whip were unlimited in number and force. In fact, many offenders did not reach the crucifixion site, as they died from the shock of the relentless scourging. Jesus endured an unimaginable scourging, and would likely have been in severe physical and mental shock when he arrived at Golgotha.
